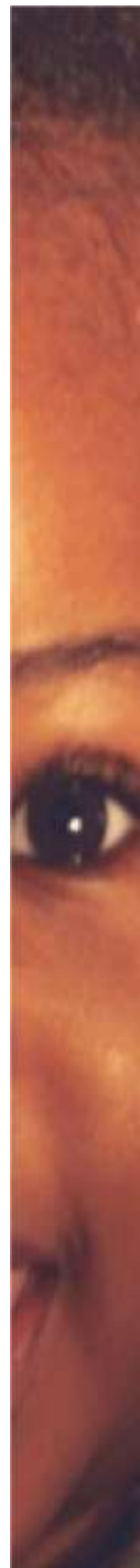

## OUR APPROACH

Based on vision of the organization, we employ two major approaches to address the needs of the African child. This intervention approaches are also deployed through two main methods. This two major approach includes:

- Preventive approach
- Remedial approach

Preventive approach focuses on involvements that are geared towards instilling positive and precautionary measure that increases the adaptive behaviors a child exhibits as he or she grows in the family or society. In this situation, the child is exposed to certain guidance through information and learning that helps in equipping him or her for immediate and future challenges

On the other hand, remedial approach addresses a child's problem or maladaptive behaviors that are expressed due to inability for the child to cope or adapt to changing internal and external demands in his or her environment. In this situation the problem behavior is to be tackled through counselling or therapeutic interventions.

The two main methods by which activities are deployed includes:

- Facility based interventions
- Community based intervention

Facility based interventions will include activities and programs that are carried out within learning environments that are structured and significant to the total development of the child. This intervention is always limited in scope and size.

Community based interventions includes activities or programs that are deployed within the social institutions in the society.

# PROJECT OVERVIEW

## **THE HURRIED CHILD PROJECT (THCP)**

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### **Overview**

The Hurried Child Project (THCP) is designed and aimed at sensitizing, mobilizing stakeholders and the public on the effects of the hurried child syndrome in Africa. The Project is a media, research, and psychosocial intervention initiative with a focus on reducing the hurried child syndrome in Nigerian families, schools, and communities. This project seeks to identify and address the root causes of the syndrome and brings to the fore the lack of, or gradual erosion of the basic essence of formal education and child rearing in our society and its attendant consequences on the emotional, physical and moral development of the African Child.

The overall goal of the project is to help improve the wellbeing and the future of the African child by establishing a sustainable network that will address the culture that emphasizes success and immediate gratification; of children being bombarded daily to grow up too quickly; pressured to learn to read and count even before they can walk; to outperform the other children in their class; in their community. To address this Syndrome, the Project is designed to implement several initiatives drawn from the research and stakeholders' inputs and buy in components of the proposed 10-year intervention plan.



# OBJECTIVES PROJECT

## OBJECTIVE OF THE HURRIED CHILD PROJECT

The main objective of the hurried child project is to reduce the causative/risk factors associated with The Hurried Child Syndrome through targeted specialized sensitization, ; regulatory enforcement, individual and community counselling, social-emotional learning, psychosocial support and media-based advocacy, counseling at family, school and community levels.

### **Specific Objectives include:**

- 1.To reduce the practices associated with the hurried child syndrome at the family level by 60% among single parents and co-working parents in Nigeria through specialized counselling and therapy by the year 2025.
- 2.To reduce the practices associated with the hurried child syndrome at the school level by 80% among public and private secondary schools in Nigeria through counselling, social-emotional learning and psychosocial support by the year 2025.
- 3.To reduce the practices associated with the hurried child syndrome at the community level by 50% among employers of labour in the private and public sector, vulnerable communities and the neighborhood through community counselling, psychosocial support and media-based advocacy by the year 2025.

# PROJECT INTERVENTIONS SUMMARIES

## The Hurried Child Press Conference and Documentary Launch (19th November 2021)

The Hurried Child Project Launch took place on the 19th of November, 2021 at Protea Hotel, by Marriott, Kuramo Waters Close, Off Akin Ogunlewe Road, VI, Lagos.

The project was strategically launched on this day as it coincides with the World Day for Prevention of Child Abuse. Using a media-based advocacy intervention to complement the research-based findings from the African perspective, the event focused on making a case for the Nigerian Child, many of whom are victims of 'the hurried child syndrome'. The approach for the campaign was to share a collection of interviews that were developed into a documentary to corroborate a cross-sectional survey conducted to examine the perception of the public on their awareness and understanding of the Hurried Child Syndrome in Nigeria.

Eighty-Nine (89) persons attended the launch. The program was decorated with experts from the academia, government agencies, professional bodies, school systems, civil society organizations and private individuals who are passionate and concerned about the future and the wellbeing of the Nigerian Child.



Learning took place experientially from key informant discussions from an experiential perspective while vicarious learning took place through the steady consumption of audiovisual contents shared intermittently during the conference.

Among the key speakers and facilitators at the event are: The First Lady of Lagos State; Mrs Dr Mrs Ibijoke Sanwo-Olu, ably represented by Mrs Edith Egube , Lagos State Commissioner for Education, (Mrs. Folashade Adefisayo), Prof Pat Utomi (Lagos Business School, Segun Arinze (Veteran Actor), Busola Kukoyi (Lagos Television), Dr Olumide Ige, (University of Lagos,) Mr. Adebayo Adeleke, (Ministry of Education), Permanent Secretary for Youth & Social Department, Mrs. Abiola Taylor (The DAWN Commission), Mrs. Shoba Ubah, (school administrator) Monalisa Chinda, a veteran actress.

The traditional media including radio, television and paper media participated in the event while the event was streamed live through AMLi social media channels. The day came to an end with a vote of thanks by the Founder of AMLi, Hanatu Enwemadu, Esq.

## The Boy-Child Sensitization Program 17th May 2022

The boy-child sensitization program is an intervention program under The Hurried Child Project. The intervention was birthed out of the need to bring to light the ills of the hurried child syndrome on the boy child and to lend a voice to the neglect of the Boy-child under the theme: The boy-child in Africa: thriving or surviving. March 4th, National Sons Day has taken on new meaning as we head into the third decade of the 21st century. Society can no longer overlook the importance of raising our boys with the legacy we leave behind as parents, patriotic stakeholders, caregivers, leaders, and the consequences of neglecting the boy child which may lead to living in anxiety and depression.

A Mother's Love Initiative (AMLi) current activities concern emphasizes the need to take time to listen to our boys, to hear their dreams or fears and thoughts on changing the world, we demand that African practices which hurry the boy child into adult responsibilities be shunned, discouraged and discontinued.



The theme speaks on “emotional” equity concerns in the workplace, home, and society. AMLI is also advocating to the Government to implement the yearly celebration of National son’s day.

Among the key speakers and facilitators at the event are: Prominent Nigerian artists including Mr. Justice Atigogo, Segun Arinze, Norbert Young, Sunny Mc Don, Chukwuka Jude and National Secretary Actors ‘Guild (AGN) of Nigeria, Abubakar Yakubu., AMLi Team.

The speakers and invited guests talked about how men have struggled with a stereotype of showing strength without fear or compassion, Nigerian fathers to have some man-to-man time with their sons. the need for fathers to have a close relationship with their sons and he further mentioned that this will create an unbreakable bond between them.

Parents were advised and encouraged to domesticate the boy child in other to avert the consequences of hurrying the boy child into adult responsibilities. The boy child barely survives when he is neglected. Fathers are encouraged to always converse with their sons about respect and lifestyle choices.

AMLi shared its views on the ills of neglecting, rushing, and overburdening the boy child and appealed to the parents, teachers, stakeholders, and caregivers to ensure they have meaningful conversations with the boys bearing in mind how important it is to raise great sons who will end up becoming great men, husbands, fathers, and leaders.

Afterward, AMLI was live on traffic FM 96.1 on the 4th of March to celebrate National Son’s day where the announcement for the essay competition was aired and the activity scope of engagement shared

The event was covered by Television stations (LTV, STV, Plus TV and NTA), radio stations (Eko FM, FRCN/Bond FM, Classic/ Beats/ Naija FM, Cool FM, Wazobia, Nigerian Info, Radio 1, Traffic FM), and newspaper media (This Day, The Punch, Vanguard, The Nation and The Guardian).

The 16th of May marking the International Day of the Boy-Child seeks to ensure an international and intentional focus on the wellbeing of the boy child and their needs to feel happy, healthy, and valued within family and community. This annual event was founded in 2018 by Dr. Jerome Teelucksingh, a university lecturer from the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. World Day of the Boy Child is growing in popularity in parts of India, North America, the Caribbean, and the African continent.

A Mother's Love Initiative (AMLi) celebrates the International Day for The Boy-Child by focusing on "the importance of a father-son relationship from the lens of the boy child".

The theme seeks to condemn the hurrying practices and societal neglect of the boy-child, the need to reestablish the commitment of fathers to the educational, moral and cultural development of their children and families as they play a pivotal role in curbing the hurried child practices in the homefront and the society at large.

Among the key speakers and facilitators at the event are: Mr. Tunde Ezichi, Founding president of computer professionals of Nigeria, Imam Ridwan Jamiu, Chief Imam, Lekki Muslim Community. Norbert Young, a veteran actor, Veteran Broadcaster, Justice Atigogo; Mrs. Yvonne Ebbe, a personality development expert, Barr. Uche Ginika, the Press Secretary of AML

The founder of AMLi, Hanatu Enwemadu in her speech stated that the boy-child is fast becoming invisible because society assumes they are invincible.

They are HURRIED through childhood into adulthood and taught to mask their pains, as their tears must not be seen because showing their pains is a sign of weakness.

They are taught to be tough: "Boys don't cry!", so they end up bottling their emotions which has adverse effects on the psychosocial balance and development of the boy-child.





She called on all and sundry, including parents, teachers, society, all levels of government, and other stakeholders in the country and the African continent to lend their voice against the unfair balance and growing neglect of the boy child and create more platforms and resources that will promote the interest and total wellbeing of the boy-child.

The keynote speaker, Mr. Tunde Ezichi, founding president of computer professionals of Nigeria shared that fathers are the most special figures in the life of the children and no matter what the equation of your relationship is with them, it is always undefined; mentioning that parent who abandons their core responsibility and over pampers their children are doing them more harm than good.

He also advised parents to retool and embrace robust parenting collaboration in raising the children, saying the trust teachers had in disciplining the children should be restored. Imam Ridwan Jamiu called on parents to live an exemplary life that will teach the boy child to look forward to adulthood with self-confidence and respect for humanity, emphasizing that being morally upright is key for good parenting.

Norbert Young, a veteran actor, mentioned that the boy-child will someday become a father, husband, and leader so the need to shape their future and model them into becoming fine members of the society. Mrs. Yvonne Ebibi, a personality development expert stressed the need to raise a responsible son in the home and in the society, she urged the parent to always remind the boy-child that it is more honorable to fail than to cheat. She advised that the boy-child should be allowed to show their pains and express their emotions.

The event ended with presentation of prizes by Barr. Uche Ginika, the Press Secretary of AMLI to the secondary school student who took part in the essay competition are expected to receive their prizes on June 19th during the Father's Day award ceremony.



## Committing to Motherhood Program: (June 1<sup>st</sup> 2022)

A Mother's Love Initiative strategic intent for the girl child and mothers was birthed out of the steady rise in hurrying practices and the hurried child syndrome.

Empowering women goes beyond just providing capacity-building programs and financial support which are the common intervention practices, there is the need to ensure that the girl-child, mother or woman is with stable mental health and psychosocial wellbeing, an indicator of optimal functioning in all areas of life.

To celebrate Global Day of Parents held on every 1st of June 2022, A Mother's Love Initiative organized a facility-based program to engage women between the ages of 18-45 on the committing to Motherhood Program held at Hub 43, A Mother's Love Initiative, 8 Jubilee CMD Road, Secretariat, Magodo GRA Lagos.

The main objective of CMP is to build a solution-focused and remedial intervention that creates an enabling platform for knowledge sharing on the ills and dangers of hurrying children during their formative years, organize community-based programs, provide social support and networking opportunities for young female adults who are on the journey to Motherhood.

Twelve (12) female participants were sensitized and psychologically empowered to take charge and ensure a balance in their career and marital responsibilities.



The intervention involved two major activities: Sensitization and psycho-education. A general session where all participants will listen to an expert talk about issues relating to marital self-efficacy, parenting, self-actualization in career and self-fulfillment in family life.

Also, a brainstorming break-up session was organized for all participants based on gender to share their views in critical areas of discussion after which a presentation is made to the house.

30 female participants were sensitized and educated on the dual role of a woman in career and family life and the consequences of the hurried child syndrome on the commitment to motherhood.

Finally, we acknowledge the efforts of the Media, Research, and External Relations Team of AMLi for their commitment to the vision and mission of the organization.





## The National Children's Day (27th May 2022)

National Children's Day Program: Experts link child rush syndrome to suicide, domestic violence, other vices 27th May

On the 27th of May, A Mother's Love Initiative in collaboration with the Federal Ministry of Education, National orientational agency, Federal ministry of women's affairs and some experts in Education and Psychology experts in Nigeria delivered a media-based advocacy intervention to create awareness on the hurried child syndrome.

The program involved an information session, a panel session and a children's session to close the day. The experts associated rushing a child through school with mental stress and low emotional intelligence that could lead to domestic violence, drug abuse and even suicide.

They further appealed to parents, guardians, teachers, school owners, and all stakeholders to celebrate each Nigerian child, their moments and stages of life, and to allow children to grow at their pace.

They also called on the government at all levels and education authorities to intensify efforts in monitoring schools and creating awareness to ensure that schools in the country adhere strictly to the curriculum as prescribed by law.



Speaking on the sidelines of the occasion, The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Founder of A Mother's Love Initiative, Hannatu Ewenmadu, said psychosocial maladjustments are inflicted on adolescents and youths as a result of hurrying them through their educational and developmental milestones which threaten their existence and wellbeing.

Also speaking, Adeyemi Adebayo, Education Specialist said that hurrying children through school allows them to skip critical stages of learning that should make them emotionally mature and capable of sustaining a home and withstanding the pressures of life.

In addition, the Director, Bankys Private School and immediate Past Chairman, National Association of Proprietors of Private Schools (NAPPS), FCT Chapter, Olusola Bankole, lamented that parents go to the extent of forging birth certificates for their children to facilitate their rushing through school.

She maintained that such actions are part of the reason for so much moral decadence in society today. A total of seven (7) schools and 35 students participated in the event and had an interactive time with all the experts and members of the press.

### Children Na Di Future (September – November 2022)

In the last quarter of 2022, Cadbury Nigeria partnered with AMLI in the production and airing of a 15-minute radio drama which created awareness on the need to raise a balanced, stable and happy child.

## Committing to Fatherhood (June 19<sup>th</sup> 2022)

Committing to Fatherhood program was conceived from the growing social isolation, unhealthy parenting habits and emotional problems experienced by fathers which have created dysfunctional male adults who cannot maintain or manage their relationships with themselves, their spouses, their children and their society resulting in mental health problems for fathers in the Nigerian society.

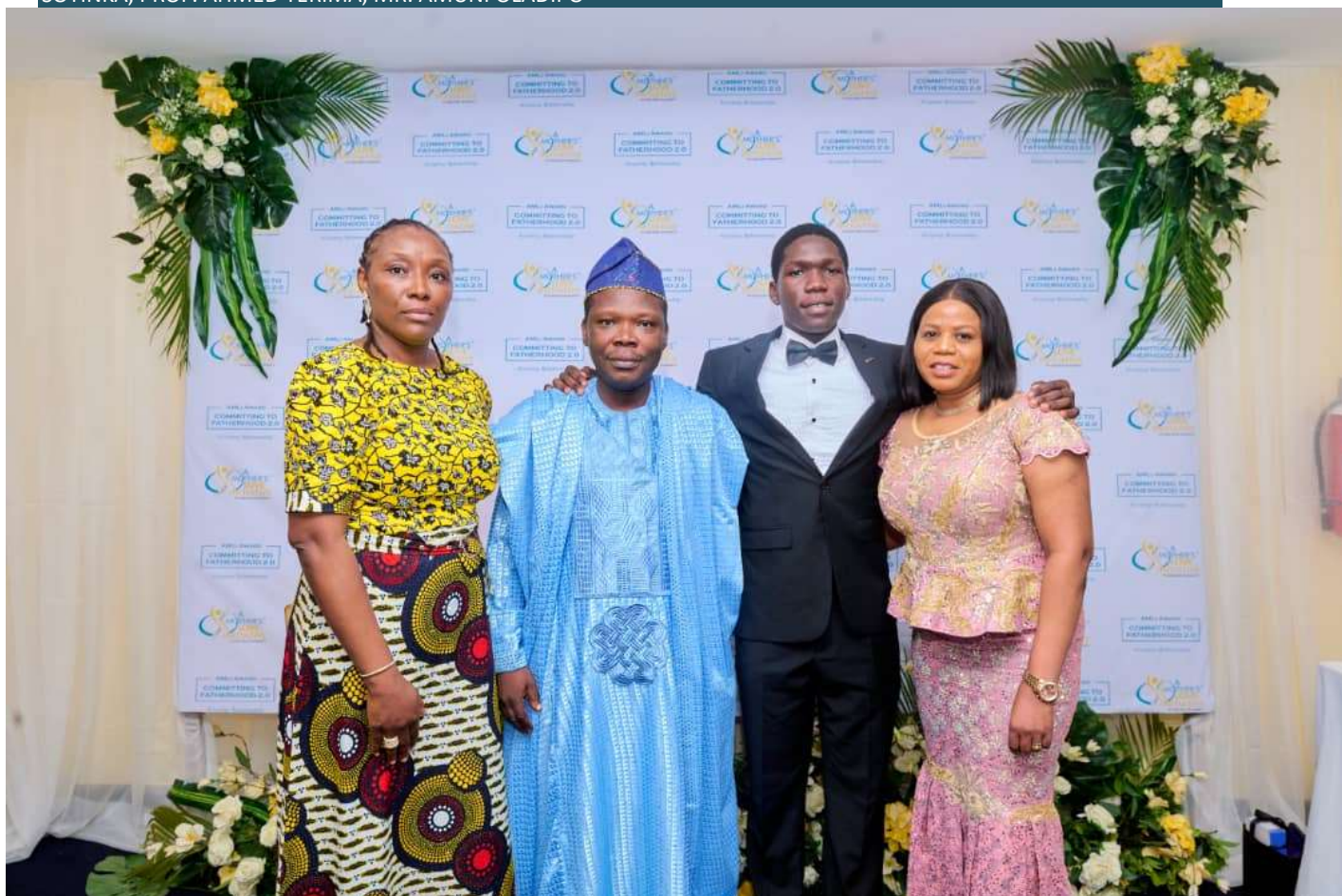
Findings from the evidence-based quantitative and qualitative research conducted by AMLI revealed that the boy-child and men are the most affected by the Hurried Child Syndrome. It has also been observed that men play a pivotal role in curbing the hurried child practices. Based on this development, it became a necessity to create a solution-focused and remedial intervention that creates an enabling platform for knowledge sharing on the ills and dangers of hurrying children during their formative years. A boy child who is allowed to grow with the right family support ends up becoming a mentally stable and balanced son, brother, husband, father, and a leader in the family and the society.

The program also serves as a platform to empathize with fathers who are not celebrated or appreciated by the society but have sacrificed their entire adulthood towards making sure the needs of the family and the society are met. Experiential learning took place between the boys and fathers or father figures in the course of the engagement.

A total of thirty (30) families, students from the University of Ibadan, BAPTIST ACADEMY, DANSOL HIGH SCHOOL, and RAINBOW COLLEGE were in attendance. The major partners of the project were ZEBRA NETWORK LTD., LENSFLAIR, and LAGOS STATE Ministry of Environment.

Press in attendance includes RADIO ONE 103.5 FM, BEAT FM 99.9 FM, PLUS TV AFRICA, PLUS TV, THE NATION NEWSPAPER, PM News, Daily Trust, Leadership, Nation, Punch, Vanguard, Guardian, The Sun.

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**Stakeholders Town Hall Meeting- Hurried Child Project. (17th of November, 2022)**



A Mother's Love Initiative organized a Stakeholders' Town Hall Meeting tagged "The Hurried Child Syndrome: Implication for Sustainable National Development" to harness the resources and information available to all state and non-state actors based on research and stakeholder's inputs.

The Hurried Child Project has carried out many media and advocacy activities in Lagos state in the past five years with remarkable impact. These programs and meetings with stakeholders and potential partners brought to the fore the reality of the National scope of the syndrome. That realization is the bases for the current impetus to scale up the project on a National scale, driving on a preliminary plan covering the 9-month period from the 25th of January, 2022 to the 31st of October, 2022.

This is in preparation for the National Roll of the Grand Master Plans as encapsulated in The Hurried Child Project Intervention Document.

The meeting was focused on comprehensively assessing the current regulatory environment and existing child development challenges and opportunities for the project; these surveys and assessments are expected to provide an evidence based and realistic basis for formulating strategic directions for each component.

The Town Hall Meeting is one of the project strategies to create awareness concerning The Hurried Child syndrome within the Nigerian society, it is expected to provide a gauge of the level of awareness; the perception of various relevant stakeholders; and what they can offer by way of intervention in advocating for measures to stop the hurried child syndrome as well as providing support to the victim.
